### **Draft DEV Package For Budget 2019**

#### **Purpose of this discussion**

- This is an **opportunity to consider and provide feedback on an initial package of initiatives for Budget 2019** in DEV-related priorities and portfolios. Similar discussions will be held in SWC and MCR on packages in those areas.
- We face significant fiscal constraints. While the Treasury is still to complete its latest forecasts, it's clear there will be more high-quality initiatives in Budget 2019 than is possible to fund.
- To ensure we deliver a Wellbeing Budget that meets our public commitments and ambition while adhering to our fiscal strategy, it is crucial we keep a clear focus on the priorities we agreed for this Budget and work collaboratively to shape a package accordingly.
- This discussion is the first in an iterative process through March and April involving Cabinet Committees, bilateral
  meetings, and Budget Ministers. I will incorporate your feedback from this discussion into the package I take to
  Budget Ministers on 11 March 2019.

#### **Questions for Discussion**

- How can we best achieve the outcomes sought in Priorities A and B through this package?
- In Priority A, are you comfortable prioritising the sustainable land use package and investing in rail? What do you think about excluding pest management?
- In Priority B, are you comfortable with the balance between supporting existing services (incl. Statistics NZ and RealMe) and new initiatives focussed on supporting businesses, digital inclusion, and the Future of Work?
- Are you comfortable with the balance between addressing cost pressures and funding for new initiatives?
- If you were to include other initiatives in this package, what would you take out?




#### **Overview of DEV Package**

  refers to the fact that the Government must continue the service, for
  legislative or reputational reasons.
- Out of scope: initiatives not aligned to one of the five Budget priorities, and not non-discretionary cost pressures.

**Living Standards Framework:** a high-level framework on the intergenerational wellbeing of New Zealanders.

**Wellbeing Domains:** the dimensions of current wellbeing that people experience.






## Recommended focus from Economic CEs


A senior officials group of Economic CEs provided recommendations on focus areas in the economic and natural resources priorities for Budget 2019. Their advice emphasised a focus on Priority A, with the following priorities:

- 1. Establishing key institutions and regulations to support broad based transition and deliver on Climate,
  Freshwater and Biodiversity commitments as well as enabling the shift from volume to value.
- Building capabilities in primary industries through practical support for transition and land use change.
- Laying a platform to reduce the costs and risks of transition over the mediumto longer-term by investing in science and innovation (and/or refocussing our existing spend in these areas).
- 4. Investing in earlier emissions reduction.
