- [34] 9(2)(g)(i) to maintain the effective conduct of public affairs through the free and frank expression of opinions
- [35] 9(2)(g)(ii) to maintain the effective conduct of public affairs through protecting ministers, members of government organisations, officers and employees from improper pressure or harassment;
- [37] 9(2)(i) to enable the Crown to carry out commercial activities without disadvantage or prejudice
- [38] 9(2)(j) to enable the Crown to negotiate without disadvantage or prejudice
- [39] 9(2)(k) to prevent the disclosure of official information for improper gain or improper advantage
- [42] 18(d) information is already publicly available or will be publicly available soon.

Finalising the Budget 2020 Package in the context of COVID-19

Objectives

The objectives of this meeting are to:

- Provide an update on the economic and fiscal outlook, in light of COVID-19 developments
- Provide an update on the draft Budget 2020 package, noting that this will be revised to take account of COVID-19

Executive Summary


- Budget 2020 is being prepared in the midst of COVID-19, which will have a large negative impact on the economy and on the government's finances.
- In recent months we have been developing the Budget 2020 package. A
 process is now underway to revise the draft Budget package to take account of
 COVID-19, for instance where it is no longer feasible to deliver some initiatives.
- The draft Budget package as it stands would allow us to make meaningful progress on our five Budget priorities, as well as meeting outstanding Government commitments and addressing cost pressures. It totals [33]

• I intend to take a revised version of this package to Cabinet for agreement on 30 March. Beyond that, we need the flexibility to take further COVID-19 related spending decisions as necessary. This is being built into the process.


COVID-19: Economic Impacts

- The situation is evolving rapidly, but it is clear that COVID-19 will have a large negative impact on the economy.
- Without the fiscal package announced on Tuesday, there would be a significant recession. The impact of the disease is becoming increasingly large, with the World Health Organisation declaring a global pandemic.
- The fiscal package provides a significant cushion to the economy, though a recession still seems almost certain, as does a significant increase in the unemployment rate.
- These are early estimates that the Treasury will continue to refine, as the COVID-19 situation develops, and we get information on the uptake of the economic support package.

Real GDP Growth





Unemployment rate



Fiscal Impact of Response

Early modelling of the economic and fiscal impact of the impact of COVID-19, and the response package, suggests **net core Crown debt rising above 25% of GDP** within two years, and **OBEGAL deficits across the forecast period.**





These results are based on the COVID-19 response package, a billion Budget package, with other policy settings as at HYEFU. It is possible the situation will appear much worse as more information becomes available and estimates are refined. A period of fiscal rebuilding will inevitably be required to return to surplus and reduce debt.


Draft Cost Pressures Package

- The draft Budget package contains cost pressure funding of \$2.0 billion p.a. operating, and \$1.2 billion total capital.
- Cost pressure initiatives are driven by volume, price, personnel, or impending changes to legislation or regulation.
- Cost pressure funding will ensure ongoing delivery of core government services, help maintain service delivery at current levels of provision, avoid baseline 'funding cliffs,' reduce the risk of redundancies, and address price pressures.





Draft 'New Spending – Other' Package

- Ministers submitted bids of \$1.3 billion operating p.a. in the 'new spending other' area. The focus of this draft package is high-value initiatives that impact on our broader wellbeing objectives but do not align to one of the five Budget priorities.
- I have prioritised initiatives that address a political commitment, or where there is limited discretion. The draft package totals \$350 million operating p.a. and \$2.2 billion capital.
- This draft package funds several significant capital investments, primarily in Votes Transport and Defence.



District Health Board Deficits

NOTE: Due to the timing of DHB annual plan submissions, the numbers included in preliminary fiscal forecasts are based on the Ministry of Health's HYEFU submission. These numbers will be updated in advance of the final fiscal forecasts.

- The 2020 Budget Economic and Fiscal Update preliminary fiscal forecasts reflect a significant **structural deficit for the DHB sector of approximately \$1 billion per year**.
- The accumulation of deficits over recent years has led to a number of DHBs exhausting their cash reserves to make
 essential operational payments. This means that additional cash will need to be provided to DHBs to ensure they can make
 essential payments, e.g. for wages and medical supplies.

Process From Here

- Following today's discussion, I will prepare a paper to take to Cabinet on 30 March to seek agreement to the Budget 2020 package.
- There is a process underway to revisit the draft package in light of COVID-19 to test whether initiatives are still feasible, deliverable and/or desirable. This will feed into the 30 March Cabinet paper.
- Once Cabinet decisions are taken, officials will prepare Budget documentation, including the economic and fiscal update, Estimates of Appropriations, and the Wellbeing Budget document.
- We need flexibility to take further COVID-19 related decisions after 30 March. To achieve this, I intend to:
 - set up a notional fund to meet COVID-19 costs
 - use "Additional Supplementary Estimates" to get Parliamentary approval for late decisions, as was done in 2011 for Christchurch earthquake-related expenditure
- I am still working towards a Budget Day of Thursday 14 May.
